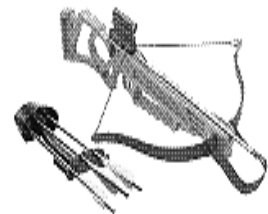
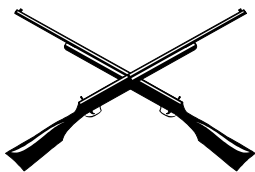


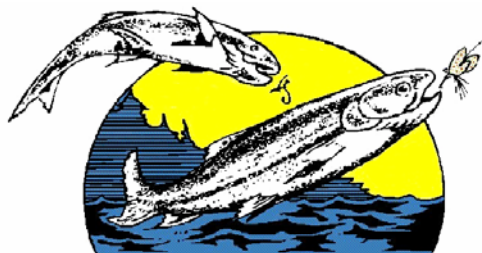

CTO Purchases Two Electric Fishing Reels

At the June 2004 Board of Directors meeting a discussion was held on the need of our physically challenged anglers to have adaptive fishing equipment. It was noted that several members could definitely benefit from the purchase of a quality rod and reel that would allow them the ability to fish more independently. Gary Knapp suggested CTO purchase a couple adaptive combos from a reputable seller. Mark Baehr noted that Fishing Has No Boundaries has a website with several models listing the manufacturers and sellers and volunteered to contact a few to learn more about them and would report back with a recommendation at the July meeting. After contacting several manufacturers Mark returned with his recommendation that CTO purchase 2 John's II adaptive fishing reels. These reels, 404 Zebcos, are battery operated and come highly recommended from FHNB as being very durable and of high quality. While the electric motor does engage the spool and retrieve the line it is not to be used as a winch. The angler will still have to fight the fish by pumping the rod and this may take a little bit of practice to get the right feel. The motion was made to purchase 2 reels and was passed unanimously.

We received the reels a couple weeks ago and have purchased two good rods to put them on. The rod & reels are now available for our members to use. We will be putting up some photos of them on our website if you're curious as to what they look like and both will be on hand at our Trout-O-Rama on September 11. We expect the rods & reels to give our members more independence and enjoyment of their fishing experiences for years to come. We also understand that our members who use these rods & reels may still need some other adaptive equipment such as a rod holder to allow them to fish as independently as they wish. We will work with them to overcome any problems they may have. We will probably keep 1 or possibly both at Larry Zander's for those coming to fish trout. **To check a rod & reel out before or after the Trout-O- Rama please call Larry at: (920) 525-5637 or Harland Chapman at (930) 833-6274.**

CTO 6th Annual Special Early October Deer Hunt

Our 6th Annual Special Early October Deer hunt takes place from Oct. 2 thru Oct. 10th and CTO is gearing up for what we anticipate being our biggest and best hunt yet. This year we have 22 physically challenged hunters signed up and thanks to the continued generosity of area landowners they'll be pursuing deer on 1,550 acres of prime deer habitat. Bill Mayville is our hunt coordinator again this year and he has proven himself to be more than up to the task. We thank Bill for his continued dedication and for doing such a great job year in and year out.

Getting all 22 hunters into the field this season will take a bit more planning and coordinating than years past. A few members have been busy building platforms and sprucing up blinds used in years past. We are in need of several more portable blinds to complement the ones we already have so if you happen to have access to a blind or two that you would be willing to lend us for the hunt please contact **Bill at: (715) 758-8363**. Also, we need several more volunteers to help get the blinds placed in the hunting areas and to help transport hunters to and from them during the hunt and to assist hunters in the field during the hunt. Hopefully the assistants will be helping to tag, gut, and transport a deer that was bagged by a successful hunter. If you have an ATV and or trailer that you could bring to help out with this task we will greatly appreciate it. Contact Bill if you are able to assist in any of these areas.

Our deer camp will be held on opening and closing weekends at the Lessor Town Hall located approximately 10 miles north of Black Creek just east of Hwy 47. **See map on page 6**. The Town Hall has a full kitchen, an interior with plenty of space to accommodate our crew and wheelchair accessible restrooms.

We will be serving breakfast and lunch on both Saturdays and Sundays. A large sit down meal is being planned for opening weekend on Saturday. Karen Baehr is our meal coordinator and will no doubt have a great variety of food lined up for all to dine on. We do have a few volunteers scheduled to help with the preparation, serving and clean up but more volunteers are always welcome. Contact **Karen at: (920) 766-9218** if you are able to lend a hand.

With the help of dedicated volunteers and landowners they will get to share their passion of hunting, create lasting memories, enjoy some great camaraderie and with some skill and maybe just a little luck many will put some venison on the table. When it comes right down to it this hunt really is the essence of what CTO is all about and we're proud to have been a part of it for the past six years and with continued support we look forward to many, many more. 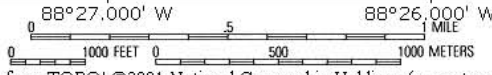
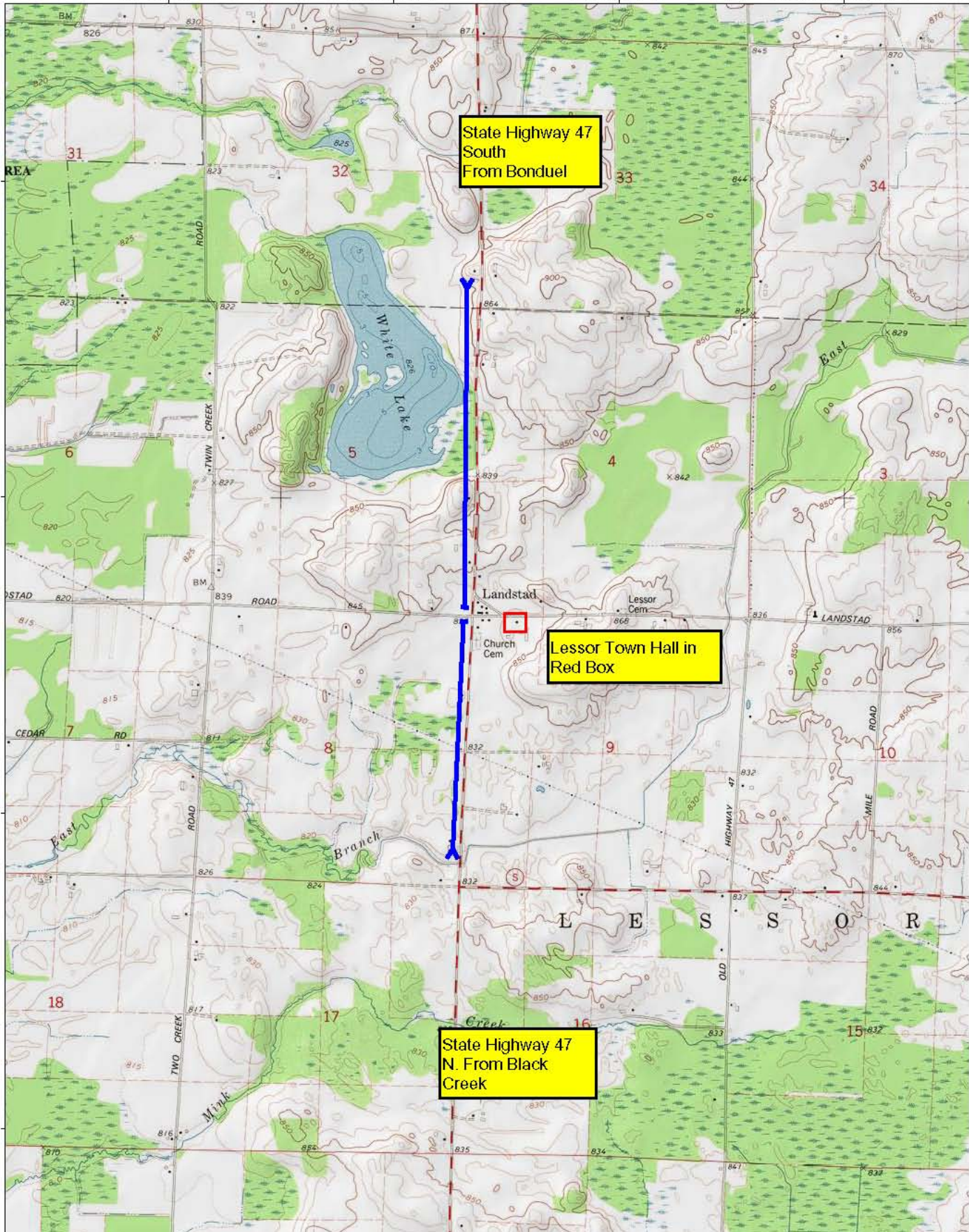

Waterfowl Within Range of Disabled Hunters in Beaver Dam

When we come across some news that we think is of interest to our physically challenged members and friends we like to pass it along. This next bit of info definitely fits that bill.

Thanks to the donations by the Beaver Dam Conservation Club and the efforts of three hunters, wheelchair bound hunters now have a prime place to hunt waterfowl this season and for many seasons to come. The group built a wheelchair-accessible waterfowl blind on the club's grounds on Beaver Dam Lake in the summer of 2003 and now they are looking for hunters interested in doing some hunting.

"We want the blind hunted every day if possible, even if that means taking time out of our season," said **Dave Bednarek**, who said the group is accepting special needs hunters on a first-come, first-served basis throughout the season. When I spoke to Rob Monet he said that the blind is reserved opening weekend but is open for the rest of the season. Rob noted that there's a chance for a variety of ducks and even geese on any given day.

We hope that you waterfowlers out there will take advantage of this great opportunity and for anyone not yet a waterfowl hunter but wanting to learn this is a great opportunity.

Hunting and Sightseeing Opportunities Await You at Navarino State Wildlife Area

With its' many flowages, grassy meadows, low-land and up-land woodlands, all providing a plentiful supply of suitable habitat for waterfowl, wild turkey, deer, grouse, and squirrel it's no wonder why so many hunters and sightseers flock to the NSWA each fall.

Located in NW Waupaca and SE Shawano counties the NSWA covers several thousand acres that provides for plenty of areas for hunters to spread out and pursue their wild game of choice. Of particular interest to physically challenged duck hunters is a wheelchair accessible duck blind located on Mc Donald Flowage.

Also worth repeating is that persons with Class A or C Disabled Hunting Permits are eligible to apply for a permit to drive on designated roads within the NSWA. The K&S WDNR property north of Shiocton, in northern Outagamie County also allows the use of ATV's by disabled permit holders that fill out an application and receive a permit.
